

The pupil premium gives schools extra funding to raise the attainment of disadvantaged pupils from reception to year 11.

The Government introduced a fund of £625 million in April 2011 to give schools £400 per year for children who:

- were registered as eligible for free school meals
- had been looked after for 6 months or longer

From April 2012, pupil premium funding was extended to include children eligible for free school meals at any point in the past 6 years. For the 2015 to 2016 financial year, funding for the pupil premium has been further increased.

The pupil premium funding is designed to address inequality by giving every school and teacher the resources they need to help their most disadvantaged pupils, allowing them the freedom to respond appropriately to individual circumstances.

For the financial year **April 2015 to March 2016** our school has received £40,920. The percentage of our pupils known to be eligible for free school meals is 5% with the national percentage being 16.2%.

During this year 2015-16, we intend to use the funding in the following ways;
