Our Vision & Ethos

We are a small Christian School with a family feel, we are proud to know our children and families well. We believe that each child is a valued member of our school community, a gift from God and we want our children to experience "Life in All Its Fullness" John 10:10 as part of living and loving like Jesus, so that everyone has the potential to grow in their own individual, unique way.

Our Approach

We believe that the teaching of Religious Education can and should offer children the opportunity to consider some of life's 'Big Questions'. This enquiry-based approach underpins our RE curriculum and ultimately everything we are as a church school.

Rationale

We aim that Religious Education will:

Provoke challenging questions about the meaning and purpose of life, beliefs, the self, issues of right and wrong, and what it means to be human. It develops pupils' knowledge and understanding of Christianity, other principal religions, and religious traditions that examine these questions, fostering personal reflection and spiritual development.

Encourage pupils to explore their own beliefs (whether they are religious or non-religious), in the light of what they learn, as they examine issues of religious belief and faith; and to express their responses.

Enable pupils to build their sense of identity and belonging, which helps them flourish within their communities and as citizens in a diverse society.

Teach pupils to develop respect for others, including people with different faiths and beliefs, and helps to challenge prejudice.

Prompt pupils to consider their responsibilities to themselves and to others, and to explore how they might contribute to their communities and to wider society. It encourages empathy, generosity and compassion.

R.E Curriculum

The new national curriculum framework as of September 2014, states that: "all state schools... must teach religious education to pupils at every key stage..."

In accordance with the structure of the locally agreed syllabus we have agreed that each term classes will either cover a question-based topic from either Understanding Christianity or Notts Agreed Syllabus.

School resources for R.E. are kept in the teacher resource cupboard. Specific resources can be ordered from the Schools Library Service, The Religious Resource Centre and Bluecoat School also offers a resource bank from which teachers are able to borrow.

We also recognise that educational trips and visitors are a valuable way of enhancing pupil experience and understanding, so trips to local churches e.g. St Michael's and Trent Vineyard, and other places such as the Holocaust Memorial Garden are planned into our curriculum.

Assessment and Recording of RE

Teachers make informal judgements through observation of pupils' responses to key questions These are recorded in a variety of different ways including in individual pupil books, Class Floor Books, displays and photos.

Each term, teaching staff making a professional judgement on the progress of each child in R.E. These assessments are used to inform future teaching and learning.

Our aim for assessment in RE to be an integral part of the whole school assessment cycle and ensure that processes are meaningful, manageable and creative.

We believe the purpose of assessment in R.E. should:

- Always be used to inform future learning through extending knowledge and development of skills.
- Give opportunity for children to demonstrate their understanding of religion and worldviews.
- Enable children to express their thoughts, questions and ideas in a variety of ways.
- ➤ Enable children to make sense of the text, make connections and demonstrate their understanding of the impact of key concepts in the world in which they live.

Collective Worship:

We aim to make collective worship relevant and enjoyable. As a Church school we hold daily collective worship and each week we follow a specific theme or school value. The values are based on Christian values and reflect our mission, vision and ethos. Example of half-termly planning:

Collective Worship, Spring Term 2025 Psalms: 'Songs from the heart'



We gather as a community for collective worship that is inspiring, invitational and inclusive, reflecting the fact that we are a part of a diverse school family and the wider church community. At the beginning of a new term and a brand new year, we begin a new series of themes, reflecting on the life and writings of King David, who contributed much of the content of the book of Pealms in the Bible. We are using the title 'Songs from the heart', because this is exactly what the Psalms were: heartfelt expressions of joy, sadness, frustration, hope and fonging, giving voice to experiences and emotions that pupils of all faiths and none can relate to. We hope that the children will enjoy in singing songs and worshiping together.

We also have regular visitors from local churches in and school's very own, pupil Worship Organisation Team to lead assemblies.

In addition to our daily assemblies, we also aim to make available to all children a range of collective worship experiences. On Monday lunchtimes for KS2 there is also a lunch time Worship Organisation Team (WOT) club. This gives over the opportunity for the children to meet together and plan towards pupil delivery of worship.

Courageous Advocacy and Outward Looking:

Through Courageous Advocacy projects, we actively encourage the children to consider themselves stakeholders in their world. We believe it is important for them to understand that they have agency and to seek ways in which they can affect changes for good in our school, local community and the world beyond.

As the bible teaches, we seek to be an outward looking school community; to be kind and generous to those around us – to Love our Neighbour as ourselves. We have strong links with local charities such as The Arches Project and Hope which are the beneficiaries of our Harvest Festivals and food banks. We have also regularly supported national and international charities such as The Shoe Box Appeal, Toilet Twinning, Comic Relief and Cancer Research.

Equal Opportunities

As a school, we place particular emphasis on RE teaching which is predominately Christian. Yet we also respect and value the differences in others and strive to avoid a sense of exclusion for those of other faiths. Our curriculum

teaches the children other main religions and encourages children to be respectful of all faiths.

As a school we will not actively seek to convert children from the faith of their parents, but pupils will experience what it is to live in a community that celebrates the Christian faith; to work within a framework of discipline and yet be confident of forgiveness; to begin to share the Christian's hope and the Christian experience of God's love.

Withdrawals

We wish to be an inclusive community but recognise that parents have a right by law to withdraw their children from the Religious Education curriculum. In this event, the school will undertake responsibility for the supervision of withdrawn pupils with regard to health and safety and an alternative activity will be provided.

Our curriculum is in line with the following documents:

We ensure that we fully meet the requirement of the statement of entitlement for Church schools. For all children to receive a high-quality Religious Education which supports them in all aspects of their learning.

"Religious education in a Church school should enable every child to flourish and to live life in all its fullness. (John 10:10). It will help educate for dignity and respect encouraging all to live well together" (Statement of Entitlement). (The statement lays out the details of coverage of the RE curriculum in church schools.)
